

## Step Up for Mental Health Events Raise Over \$80,000 for Mental Health Initiatives in Northumberland County

The Step Up for Mental Health 5K run/walk and Cameco Charity Golf Tournament together raised approximately \$80,000 for mental health initiatives in Northumberland County.

### Step Up for Mental Health 5K

The Step Up for Mental Health 5K took place on May 13 in Cobourg with over 600 registered participants. Over \$25,000 in registration fees were collected, with 100 per cent of those fees being matched by Cameco. An additional \$7,000 in donations were also collected through participant fundraising for a total of \$57,000 raised for the Cameco Fund for Mental Health.

“We were thrilled to see such an amazing turnout for the Step Up for Mental Health 5K,” said Sara Forsey, manager, public and government affairs. “We are thankful to the community for joining together with us to raise much needed funds for mental health. You could really feel how important this cause is to everyone who participated.”

Thanks to a partnership with performance shoe company New Balance, first responders were eligible to pick up a free pair of New Balance shoes for the run.

“New Balance has been an excellent partner for this event,” said Forsey. “They have really stepped up to help make this a very special day.”

# Vision In Motion: Building 27 Removal Sees Significant Progress

The Vision in Motion project at the Port Hope Conversion Facility is making significant progress on the removal of Building 27.

Building 27 is still covered in a tarp from top to bottom, but the building is beginning to look very different behind the tarp.

“All of the exterior building panels have now been removed from Building 27,” said Shane Watson, program manager, stakeholder relations. “Only the structural frame and floors of the building remain. These will slowly be dismantled over the rest of the year.”

The building and scaffolding height will continue to be reduced as the dismantling takes place. The work to remove Building 27 has been going on for several

years. Equipment removal from the building was the first step and the structural dismantling began this year. The scaffolding around the exterior started in October, with the tarping of the building taking place over the first few months of 2023.

This has been a busy year for Cameco’s Fuel Services Division, and I am very proud of the work that we have accomplished so far.

The most visible piece of work to the community is our Vision in Motion project at the Port Hope Conversion Facility (PHCF).

This project has been many years in the making, and we have worked diligently and methodically to dismantle Building 27 in a way that protects the health and safety of workers, the public and the environment. I’m happy to see such visible progress happening as we safely dismantle Building 27. We will continue to share updates on the project as we reach further milestones.

I am also very proud of the safety performance at PHCF. For the second year in a row, PHCF has received the Mary-Jean Mitchell Green award for outstanding safety performance within all of Cameco. This is a tremendous accomplishment for the site, and it wouldn’t be possible without the hard work and dedication of every employee at the site.

Not to be out done, the Blind River Refinery also celebrated a significant safety milestone this year, reaching 17 years without a lost-time injury.

Cameco Fuel Manufacturing (CFM) has also enjoyed some significant accomplishments. Earlier this year, CFM was granted a 20-year Fuel Facility Operating Licence from the Canadian Nuclear Safety

Commission (CNSC). This allows CFM to operate until February 28, 2043, at which time CFM can request to renew the licence. As part of the licence, CFM will participate in a comprehensive mid-point (10-year) review of its operational performance. We are very grateful for the many positive interventions from members of the community submitted to the CNSC during the licensing process.

CFM also hosted the announcement of the 10-year extension of Cameco’s exclusive fuel supply agreement with Bruce Power. This agreement includes provisions for Cameco to supply 100 per cent of Bruce Power’s uranium, conversion services, and fuel fabrication requirements. This long-term agreement means that Cameco will continue to play a key role in

supplying Ontario with clean-air nuclear power for years to come. The next time you turn on your lights, keep in mind that there’s a very good chance it’s being powered by clean-air electricity generated from uranium processed right here in Port Hope.

And I want to thank you – the community. You stepped up to come out and run and golf so that together we raised approximately \$80,000 for mental health programs. And hundreds of you turned up at our community BBQ in June to talk to us and it was a pleasure to meet so many of you.
